Sensitisation Workshop to **Enhance Cervical Cancer Screening Research**

7 November 2024



Under the leadership of the Maternal Health (MH) Programme of the DGHS, AdSEARCH is conducting a study titled "Assessing implementation Outcomes of Enhanced Screening Package for Cervical Cancer in a Rural Primary Care Setting of Bangladesh". At the Maternal Health Conference Room, EPI Bhaban, Dhaka, the study team in the first week of November has organised a sensitisation programme. The programme was chaired by the Line Director, MNC&AH of DGHS,

Dr S. M. Abdullah-Al-Murad.

During the workshop, the participants decided to form the Technical Working

Group (TWG). The Obstetric Gynaecological Society of Bangladesh (OGSB) and other development partners working with maternal health agreed to support the study. Experts from the MH programme of DGHS, OGSB, WHO, UNICEF, icddr,b and other relevant organisations will be members of the TWG.

At the workshop, **Dr Quamrun Nahar** from icddr,b highlighted the importance of early screening to prevent cervical cancer. **Dr Md. Azizul Alim** explained Bangladesh's current cervical cancer screening efforts and why it's essential to make these services available in more

Cervical cancer is the second most common cancer among women in Bangladesh and causes 3.42 lakh deaths worldwide, according to a report by the World Health Organization (WHO). Early screening can help reduce the death toll.

rural areas.

Professor **Dr Farhana Dewan** from OGSB then discussed their work in preventing and treating cervical cancer and emphasised the importance of partnerships in the fight against this disease. **Dr Sabrina Jabeen** presented the protocol emphasising how the enhanced screening package would improve the coverage for screening of cervical cancer in rural areas.

Dialogue on the Prematurity Burden, **Intervention Status, and Innovations** in Bangladesh

23 November 2024



While the country has seen an increase in neonatal care facilities over the last decade, quality remains a concern. In Bangladesh, three newborns die every hour due to prematurity and low birth weight.

To address this issue on a national scale, a workshop titled "Dialogue on the Prematurity Burden, Intervention Status, and Innovations in Bangladesh" was jointly organised by Neonatology Department of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) and AdSEARCH.

Two scientific presentations were delivered at the workshop. Firstly Dr Ahmed Ehsanur Rahman explained that babies born before completing 40 weeks of gestation are at risk of respiratory distress, jaundice, and anemia. Also, stressing that steroid injections administered shortly before birth significantly reduce these risks,

although access remains limited. In the second presentation, Prof. Dr Md Abdul Mannan reported that over the past decade, Bangladesh has made notable progress in expanding interventions like Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) and Special Care Newborn Units (SCANU). However, only 16% of these newborns received quality care. He also pointed that, Skin-to-skin contact between a newborn and the mother can reduce neonatal mortality rates up to 25%. During the open discussion session, Major (Retd.) Dr Laila Arjuman Banu, highlighted several maternal factors contributing to premature births, including infections during pregnancy, uterine abnormalities, high blood pressure, diabetes, and kidney issues. Prof. Sanjoy Kumar Dey emphasised the importance of breastfeeding campaigns in reducing premature and low birth weight (LBW) infant mortality.

Bangladesh has the highest preterm birth rate in the world, with 16.2% of babies born prematurely compared to 13% in India and 14.4% in Pakistan.

Dr Md Jahurul Islam, pointed out the lack of skilled personnel and adequate equipment in many medical centers outside Dhaka.

Experts at the workshop called for strengthened efforts to address gaps in the healthcare system.

The experts also emphasised that further investments in healthcare infrastructure, skilled personnel, and public awareness are crucial to saving lives. They urged policymakers to prioritise these issues to ensure that every newborn receives the care necessary to survive and thrive.
